Pearson's techniques clearly showed that seeking out pitched battles

was not the only way to fight in Vietnam.9

Pearson hoped for better results from his next campaign, Operation SEWARD, using the same maneuver battalions that had carried out JOHN PAUL JONES. This time he placed Wasco's 2d of the 327th Infantry north of Tuy An and a company of Collins' 1st of the 327th Infantry in the Hieu Xuong Valley southwest of Tuy Hoa. Morley's 1st of the 22d Infantry would secure the area between Vung Ro Bay and Tuy Hoa. Dietrich's 2d of the 502d Infantry would serve as a rapid-reaction force. Morley's and Dietrich's units would function as reserve forces, but they would also carry out operations west and northwest of Tuy Hoa. 10

SEWARD began early on the morning of 5 September. The Americans knew the terrain from previous operations—dry flatlands, dotted with
