Brief History of the 501st, 502nd and 2nd Brigade (101st ABN DIV)

The 502nd, or "five-oh-deuce", was activated July 1, 1941 at Fort Benning, Georgia as the 502nd parachute infantry battalion, as an experimental unit formed to test the doctrine and tactics of parachute assaults. The 502nd entered combat in World War II on June 6, 1944, by jumping into Normandy, with allied forces landing on D-Day and the Battle of Normandy. Between 1945 and 1964. A major reorganization took place on 3 February 1964, when the 2nd Brigade of the 101st Airborne was activated at Fort Campbell, replacing the 1st Airborne Battle Group, 501st Infantry Regiment. The reorganization from the battle groups to brigades and battalions placed two battalions of the 502nd in different brigades of the 101st.



The 2nd Battalion, 502nd Infantry was in the 1st Brigade with 1-327th and 2-327th Infantry. Which deployed to Vietnam and arrived at Cam Ranh Bay, Vietnam on 29 July 1965, they were commanded by the most notable commander LTC Hank "The Gunfighter" Emerson.



The new 2nd Brigade's original organic battalions were the 1st and 2d Battalions, 501st Infantry, and the 1st Battalion, 502nd Infantry. December 1967 the 501st, 502nd and 2nd Brigade deployed by C-141 aircraft and arrived at Bien Hoa Airbase on 13 December 1967. Over the next five years, Soldiers of the "Ready to Go" Brigade participated in twelve campaigns, compiling of a distinguished combat record as well as an enviable reputation for success in the rehabilitation of a war-torn nation. The Brigade redeployed to Fort Campbell in April 1972.



During this week, in the span of 8 years since the 501st Infantry Regiment, 502nd Infantry Regiment and 2nd Brigade, 101st Airborne Division deployed in support of the Vietnam War the following are from After Action Reports, Staff Duty Logs, and Personal Accounts. (* All items have been reproduced from the Unclassified / Declassified Holdings of the National Archives.)

January 1968

2-501 IN BN began the new year in the III CTZ operating area in the vicinity of CU CHI, RVN. In January, the entire Battalion was airlifted to HUE in northern I CTZ. During the remainder of the year, the Battalion operated within a 50-kilometer radius of HUE.

Operations during the year included, reconnaissance in force, search and destroy, cordon and search, and security missions. Contact was sporadic and ranged from encounters with individual's trail watchers to engagements with reinforced platoons in well prepared defensive positions.

During the year, the Battalion was commanded by three different individuals: LTC Richard Tallman (1 Jan – 27 Apr 1968), LTC J. A. Heiter (27 Apr – 4 Nov 1968), and LTC J. C. Wilson (4 Nov 1968). Also, during the year, the Battalion was reorganized from an airborne to an airmobile configuration while continuing to perform all missions assigned.

January 1968

During the first portion of January 1968, the 2-501 IN BN operated in the vicinity of CU CHI, RVN and participated in both Operation UNIONTOWN and NORMANDY. No significant contact was made during this period; however, numerous mines and booby traps were encountered.

January 1968

II FFV (BINH DONG PROV) – 101st ABN DIV elements engaged enemy force 35km NNW SAIGON and exchanged SA & AW fire. Other element BDE, Gunships and Artillery reinforced. (MACV Summary for January 1968)

January 1970

Operation RANDOLPH GLEN: The STRIKE Force (2-502 IN BN) opened the New Year with a continuation of Operation RANDOLPH GLEN. FSB RIFLE (YD862988) served as the base of operation for the Battalion with the maneuver Companies located in the canopy to the north and south of the firebases. Joint US/ARVN operations were to play a significant role throughout the New Year. Contacts with the enemy were initially characterized by STRIKE Force Soldiers initiating contact, with the enemy quickly disengaging. (2-502 Unit History, Vietnam 1970; Approved by LTC Lloyd N. Cosby, IN Commanding)



01 January 1968

HQ/2-501 IN COL Tallman and CPT Cizmada left for recon in UH-1 at 1005H. At 0605H, BN CO, S2, S3 and ARTY LNO left PC to recon area in northern position PHILHELL woods. At 0645H All staff officer went on recon in UH-1. (HQ, 2-501 IN; Daily Staff Journal or Duty Officer's Log; 01 January 1968)

01 January 1969

Operation NEVADA EAGLE: The 1-502 IN BN started out the year as a participant in Operation NEVADA EAGLE. A/1-502 IN provided bridge and mine security at AN LO. B/1-502 IN conducted operation vicinity YD585398. C/1-502 IN conducted operations vicinity YD6107177, YD615192 and YD619190. At YD615192, D/1-502 IN, 3rd platoon found one 30cal carbine and 16 bunkers. D/1-502 IN provided security at FSB T-BONE and Recon platoon conducted operations vicinity YD641316, YD640326 and YD640320.

01 January 1969

Operation NEVADA EAGLE: At 095 hours, vicinity YD925000 C/2-502 IN engaged 4 VC moving east on a trail resulting in 1 VC/NVA KIA, 1 AK-47 with three magazines. Due to the presence of heavy blood trails after this contact, a Combat Tracing Team was requested. Due to faulty equipment, only the Visual Tracing team was able to repel into C/2-502 IN. (HQ, 2-502 IN; Combat Operation After Action Report; Operation Nevada Eagle; 31 January 1969)

01 January 1970

Operation RANDOLPH GLEN: NAM HOA District made contact with an estimated 15 VC. The VC walked into the ambush of claymore and small arms. Blood stains on the ground when the VC withdrew indicated at least two casualties. The 1-502 IN BN continued Operation RANDOLPH GLEN with negative results.



01 – 31 January 1971 During this period the 1-501 IN BN conducted refresher training at PBCB from 28 December 1970 to 06 January 1971. Training was orientated towards company training, marksmanship, maintenance, contact teams and commanders time. On 06 January, the battalion moved to FSB RAKKASAN to occupy, defend and improve the FB, and carry out search and attack missions in its respective area of operation. D/1-501 IN provided security for the FB and also utilized human and mechanical ambushes nightly. On 13 January, D/1-501 IN was inserted into its area of operation and C/1-502 IN assumed the responsibility of defending the FB. B/1-501 IN replaced C/1-501 IN on 23 January and moved with the battalion to FB ARSENAL on 27 January, leaving one platoon in Phu Bai to conduct nightly ambushes to aid in defense of PBCB. During the reporting period a light mortar platoon was organized on B/1-501 IN. This element consisted of one 81mm mortar tube and 15 to 20 men. Its purpose was to provide the company commander with fire support under his direct control. (1st Battalion, 501st Infantry Unit History)

02 - 05 January 1968 **Operation KLAMATH FALLS:** At 1200H, Operation KLAMATH FALLS resumed with A/2-502 IN working from high ground to low ground while B/2-502 IN & C/2-502 IN, and Reconos blocked likely egress routes from the high ground in their AO's. This orientation was continued through January 5th with A/2-502 working the fingers and draws to their AO boundary. The result was the destruction of a rice cache of approximately 12 tons of unpolished rice. (HQ, 2-502 IN BN; Combat Operations After Action Report; Operation Klamath Falls; 11 January 1968)

02 January 1968 At 0705H, B/2-501 IN had one (1) man absent during morning report – PFC Paul S. Sondey. Negative activity reported for the day. (HQ, 2-501 IN; Daily Staff Journal or Duty Officer's Log; 02 January 1968)

02 January 1969 **Operation NEVADA EAGLE:** A/1-502 IN provided bridge and mine sweep security at AN LO. A/1-502 IN, 1st platoon and 2nd platoon, conducted RIF operations vicinity AN LO. 2nd platoon lifted to LZ SALLY assumed duties as Brigade RRF. B/1-502 IN conducted search and clear operations vicinity YD599394. At YD582400, B/1-502 IN, 2nd platoon found approximately 1 ton of rice and destroyed it. B/1-502 IN, 3rd platoon found 1 bandoleer of M-16 ammunition and 1 bandoleer of M-79 ammunition at YD576383. B/1-502 IN, 1st platoon found a homemade booby trap at YD585394. At YD603384, 1st platoon found approximately 100 pounds of rice and gave it to the PF's. B/1-502 IN, 3rd platoon found small cache of medicine at YD595384. C/1-502 IN conducted RIF operations vicinity YD618190. At YD611192, C/1-502 IN, 3rd platoon found 5 bunkers showing signs of recent use. They also found a fresh latrine, 1 AK magazine, and some food. D/1-502 IN established NDP at FSB T-BONE. D/1-502 IN, 1st platoon conducted RIF operations in the vicinity. Recon platoon conducted RIF operations form vicinity YD6829 to vicinity YD7131. The BN Surgeon conducted Medcap at YD736297; 45 Vietnamese attended.

02 January 1969 **Operation NEVADA EAGLE:** At 1220H, vicinity YC933004 C/2-502 IN, C20 engaged 4 VC/NVA resulting in enemy dead and miscellaneous equipment. At 1930H, vicinity YC919980 Recon discovered another small cache of weapons and equipment. (HQ, 2-502 IN; Combat Operation After Action Report; Operation Nevada Eagle; 31 January 1969)

02 January 1970 **Operation RANDOLPH GLEN:** The 2BDE and Battalion Commanders met the C/1-502 IN Commander on FSB ARSENAL to discuss the progress of the firebase. A/1-502 IN located unexploded bomb Vic 775025. An EOD team was requested and sent. D/1-502 IN, 1st platoon found a VC/NVA mortar position. It was 8 feet in diameter designed for an 82mm mortar. Location was 779106. C/1-502 IN, 3rd platoon located a spider hole and 3 fighting positions at 793071 that were recently built.

03 January 1968 1-502 IN BN conducted combat assaults. The 1st lift went Airborne at 0807H and the last lift completed at 0917H. A/1-502 IN and B/1-502 IN discovered numerous Booby-Traps and fresh sign. D/1-502 IN made heavy contact. The 1-502 IN BN set up for night defensive position. All NDP sites were mortared during the night. U.S. Casualties (slight) 23 WIA; (Evac) 13 WIA.

03 – 05 January 1968 2-501 IN BN conducts 2BDE's first airmobile operation in Vietnam; combining air, gunship, and artillery support on a search and destroy mission into the Filhol woods, discovering a new enemy base camp.

03 January 1968 At 0745H, it was reported that all companies to no move to PZ until ordered. C/2-501 IN be prepared by 0900H, remain in unit AO. At 0937H, C/2-501 IN arrived at PZ. At 1025H, ARTY firing to clear for conducte of strike, 1st lift of C/2-501 IN. At 1030H, C/2-501 IN on LZ HOAH and reported LZ is cold. At 1042H, 2nd lift of C/2-501 IN lift off and arrived at LZ HOAH at 1047H. At 1054H, 3rd lift of C/2-501 IN lift off and arrived at LZ HOAH at 1058H, At 1106H, 4th lift of C/2-501 IN lift off and arrived at LZ HOAH at 1111H, At 1118H, 5th lift of C/2-501 IN lift off and arrived at LZ HOAH at 1124H. ARTY followed in 30 minutes into LZ HOAH. At 1153H, Lift 6 off, artillery. Prep starting at the time for our TALON and CLAW. At 1157H, rounds complete and prep realing to 4 gunship working the LZ. Between 1204H and 1237H, air lifts to LZ TALON and CLAW was conducted and completed. At 1240H, A/2-501 IN reported hving a Soldier on LZ CLAW with a sprained ankle and cant walk, BN CO will pick up with C&C ship. At 2000H, sampan floated past 2 positions, 2 engaged with M079 and M0-16 at least M-79 (10) rounds hit but keep on floating. At 2005H, D/2-501 IN spotted DC one on opposite side of river. At 2125H, C/2-501 IN reported having rounds falling 20 meters form position bleived to be M-79. At 2126H, C/2-501 IN reported rounds still falling close to perimeter believed either M-79 or grenade, one (1) fell in the perimeter, negative casualties. At 2155H-2156H, A/2-501 IN reported seeing 2 persons 50 meters to front. At 2200H, C/2-501 IN still receiving rounds in front of ambush site. At 2205H, B/2-501 IN reported seeing one (1) person 50 meter to front. At 2210H, B/2-501 IN reported taking one carbine round overhead, negative contact. At 2216H, C/2-501 IN reeived one (1) incoming grenade, negative contact. At 2320H, D/2-501 IN reported seeing a sampan at the same coordinate as the last Sampan was rproted the patrol engaged with M-79 fire and small arms fire. No further activity or contact reported (HQ, 2-501 IN; Daily Staff Journal or Duty Officer's Log; 03 January 1968)



03 January 1969 **Operation NEVADA EAGLE:** A/1-502 IN conducted bridge and mines weep security at AN LO. B/1-502 IN conducted search and clear operations vicinity YD597383 with 2 platoons of PF. At YD600377, B/1-502 IN, 1st platoon and PF's spotted 5 VC and called in artillery. A check at first light produced negative results. At YD595383, B/1-502, 2nd platoon found approximately 300 pounds of spoiled rice and destroyed it. B/1-502 IN, 3rd platoon found an antipersonnel mine at YD617389 and destroyed it. C/1-502 IN conducted a RIF operation and day and night ambushes in vicinity YD618201. At 0933H at YD605187, C/1-502 IN, 2nd platoon engaged 4 VC. VC moved to the west with unknown enemy casualties. At 1045H, at the same location, C/1-502 IN, 2nd platoon engaged 1 VC resulting in 1 VC WIA. Platoon followed blood trails to the south. At 1158H, vicinity YD611197, C/1-502 IN 3rd (?2nd) platoon engaged 1 VC, resulting in 1 VC WIA and 1 AK-47 captured, and found a rucksack with documents. At 1250H at YD611137, D/1-502 IN, 2nd platoon engaged an 8-man NVA patrol, wearing new uniforms, rucksacks and carrying AK-47's. The patrol moved out to the northeast. There were unknown enemy casualties and negative US casualties. At 1437 hours at YD612187, C/1-502 IN, 2nd platoon reported 1 wounded VC CHIEU HOI. D/1-502 IN provided security for FSB T-BONE. 1st and 2nd platoon conducted RIF operations vicinity FSB T-BONE. Recon platoon conducted RIF operations vicinity YD733333.

03 January 1969 **Operation NEVADA EAGLE:** At 1530H another small cache was in a group of huts was discovered by 2-502 IN BN, Recon platoon in the vicinity of YC931984. (HQ, 2-502 IN; Combat Operation After Action Report; Operation Nevada Eagle; 31 January 1969)

03 January 1970 **Operation RANDOLPH GLEN:** D/1-502 IN trained 35 PF's at location 755128, A/1-502 IN, 1st platoon found a bomb 10 to 13 inches in diameter in about 1 foot of water located 801017, D/1-502 IN, 2nd platoon, 2nd squad found a spider hole 1'x2'x3' with no recent signs of use. The hole was located at 781173.

03 January 1970 **Operation RANDOLPH GLEN:** C/2-502 IN initiated contact when two NVA's were killed in an ambush and 2 AK-47's was captured.

04 January 1968 D/2-501 IN found two tunnels 1 3' in diameter and 16' deep, 3 such tunnels dead end. D/2-501 IN found 4 - 60mm mortar casing vicinity XT664240. (HQ, 2-501 IN BN; Daily Staff Journal or Duty Officer's Log; 04 January 1968)

04 January 1968 During early morning hours, the NDP of A/1-502 IN & D1-502 IN received rockets in their perimeter. During the daylight hours the Battalion conducted search and destroy operations. C/1-502 IN made heavy contact and was supported by gunships and artillery. C/1-502 IN had 10 WIA. B/1-502 IN moved to support C/1-502 IN and came under heavy contact with results of 7KIA, 1WIA, one man discovered MIA. Overall results: Friendly: 36 WIA, 8 KIA, 1 MIA. Enemy: 27 KIA(BC) 2 WIA (POW)

04 January 1968 At 0150H, C/2-501 IN reported 2 rounds being fired one (1) was M-79 and the other could not be identified. At 0155H, C/2-501 IN received one (1) round, seemed like a carbine round. No damage or casualties. At 0505H, D/2-501 IN fired a M-79 at suspected movement to there front, still checking it out. At 0715H, 3 requests when D/2-501 IN will conduct operations in COBRA, 50 minutes was reply. A/2-501 IN also same time in area WASP. At 0940H D/2-501 IN gone to AO COBRA, A/2-501 IN gone to WASP. B/2-501 IN gone to EAGLE. C/2-501 IN (-) and Recon gone vicinity LZ CLAW. At 0945H, A/2-501 IN reported moving into area WASP now. At 1007H, A/2-501 IN spotted individual running into woods vicinity XT666234. At 1012H, D/2-501 IN found 2 tunnels, one (1) 3' in diameter & 16' deep. Three (3) such tunnels dead end. 4 - 60' mortar casing found at XT664240 and 2 at XT666240, 3'D seat. At 1139H, C/2-501 IN held due to artillery firing from LZ HOOK in support of 1-502 IN BN. At 1207H, A/2-501 IN inspecting what appears to be a base camp vicinity XT668232. At 1211H, lift into CLAW was conducted. At 1247H, A/2-501 IN reported finding 15-20 bunkers. At 1255H, forard CP reported 2 VC floating down river in bushes, fired on these and they went to the other bank, results unknown. At 2105H, all elements and ambush patrols in position, Negative activity. (HQ, 2-501 IN; Daily Staff Journal or Duty Officer's Log; 04 January 1968)

04 January 1969 **Operation NEVADA EAGLE:** A/1-502 IN provided bridge and mine sweep security at AN LO. B/1-502 IN conducted search and clear operations and day and night ambushes vicinity YD597383 with 2 platoons of PF's. At YD602388, B/1-502 IN, 1st platoon found 1 Chicom booby trap and destroyed it in place. At YD584395, B/1-502 IN, 3rd platoon found 20 sandbags full of rice and footprints leading to the north. C/1-502 conducted RIF operations vicinity YD618186. At YD604195, C/1-502 IN, 2nd platoon found 3 hooches, 1 M-79 grenade launcher, 4 Chicom grenades, ammunition, NVA clothing, fresh food and medicine. At 1535H, at the same location, 2nd platoon engaged 1 VC, resulting in the capture of 1 VC WIA, 1 AK-47 and documents. D/1-502 IN provided security for FSB T-BONE and 3rd platoon conducted RIF operations. Recon platoon conducted RIF operations vicinity YD7322338.

04 January 1969 **Operation NEVADA EAGLE:** While searching an area 7km southwest of HUE, C/1-502 IN picked up one Viet Cong officer and three weapons. In two contacts near FSB QUICK, two enemy killed and four weapons, C/2-502 IN accounted the capture. (Rendezvous with Destiny (Volume 2, Number 1); Spring 1968-69)

04 January 1969 **Operation NEVADA EAGLE:** Ground activity picked up and at 0917 hours in the vicinity of YD936002 C/2-502 IN engaged 3 enemy at close range resulting in 1 VC/NVA trail watcher and captured two weapons. (HQ, 2-502 IN; Combat Operation After Action Report; Operation Nevada Eagle; 31 January 1969)

04 January 1970 D/1-502 IN, 1st platoon utilized a dog team to aid in their patrol. D/1-502 IN, 2nd platoon continued to train PF's. A/1-502 IN, 3rd platoon while searching vicinity 789024 found 4 rockets each 4' long 5" in diameter. Two of the rockets were wrapped in NVA ponchos. At location 819035 Recon found part of a map of Laos and Vietnam.

05 January 1968 Starting at 0930H, moving of units were conducted. 2-501 IN BN reported to BDE that Bunker 60 has lost comms with their command. One man has been hit with rifle grenade. 2-501 IN BN will send FLA. At 2305H, battalion received on casualty from bunker 60 with shrapnel in left eye. At 2320H, all companies present of accounted for. (HQ, 2-501 IN BN; Daily Staff Journal or Duty Officer's Log; 05 January 1968)



05 January 1968 1-502 IN BN continued search and destroy missions around CU CHI. Bravo linked up with a tank unit and returned to area of contact to find MIA. Body found and identified as missing man. Other companies had negative contact and returned to CU CHI for night. Change: 1 MIA to 1 KIA

05 January 1969 Paratroopers of 1-501 IN BN supported the initiation of 2-54 ARVN soft cordon of the northern end of VINH LOC Island. (Rendezvous with Destiny (Volume 2, Number 1); Spring 1968-69)

05 January 1969 **Operation NEVADA EAGLE:** A/1-502 IN located at AN LO provided bridge and mines weep security 1st platoon acted as BDE RRF. B/1-502 IN conducted search and clear operations with 2 platoons of PF's vicinity YD5939. C/1-502 IN conducted RIF operations vicinity YD6118. D/1-502 IN provided security for FSB T-BONE. Recon platoon conducted RIF operations vicinity YD6736.

05 January 1969 **Operation NEVADA EAGLE:** The 2-502 successfully accomplished its mission as evidenced by the following below:

05 January 1970 **Operation RANDOPHL GLEN:** D/1-502 IN, 1st platoon at location 755128 is training 23 PF's in map reading, claymore and M16 rifle. A body was sighted today floating on the river. It was identified as 1 NVA soldier of a sapper battalion killed by small arms fire.

05 January 1970 **Operation RANDOLPH GLEN:** A single enemy was engaged by an OP from C/2-502 IN resulting in one confirmed body count and one weapon captured. While in a night defensive position, C/2-502 IN had several enemy approaches their position. When the enemy tripped a trip flare, he was engaged by small arms fire. The enemy returned fire and fled, leaving one dead behind.



During this week, in the span of 8 years since the 501st Infantry Regiment, 502nd Infantry Regiment and 2nd Brigade, 101st Airborne Division deployed in support of the Vietnam War the following awards were awarded to the service members during combat operations.

1LT Larry D. Earls (C/2-502 IN) was awarded the Purple Heart Medal (Posthumously) for military merit and for wounds received which resulted in his death while on perimeter guard and hit by hostile sniper fire in the KONTUM Province, Republic of Vietnam.

02 January 1967



PFC Wilbur L. Kohr (C/2-502 IN) was awarded the Purple Heart Medal (Posthumously) for military merit and for wounds received which resulted in his death while on perimeter guard and hit by hostile small arms fire in the KONTUM Province, Republic of Vietnam.

PFC Walter L. Goshorn (C/2-502 IN) was awarded the Purple Heart Medal (Posthumously) for military merit and for wounds received which resulted in his death while he was on perimeter guard when engaged by hostile forces employing grenades and small arms fire in the KONTUM Province, Republic of Vietnam.

SGT Thomas R. Gdovin (D/1-502 IN) was awarded the Purple Heart Medal for military merit and for wounds received during action in combat in South Vietnam.

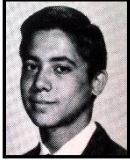

PFC Steven A. Wessel (D/1-502 IN) was awarded the Bronze Star Medal (Posthumously) PFC Wessel died from Non-hostile causes from Air Loss, Crash-Land-Helicopter-Noncrew in the Thua Thien Province, Republic of Vietnam. On this day, an OH-6 (tail number 67-16363) from A Battery, 377th Artillery was employed in providing artillery spotting in support of the 1st Bn, 321st Arty. At about 1630, after two hours on mission, the pilot - 1LT Kenneth L. Fountain of Savannah, Georgia - landed his aircraft at Fire Support Base T-BONE, contacted his base operations, and advised them that weather conditions made it unlikely he would be able to return to Camp Eagle. 1LT Fountain was directed to remain overnight at FSB T-BONE if the weather had not cleared by 1800.

At 1800 1LT Fountain decided to remain overnight at T-BONE. Since his aircraft was on a pad outside T-BONE's night defensive perimeter he fired it up with the intention of doing a low hover uphill to a pad within the NDP. PFC Steven A. Wessel was allowed to board as a passenger for the short flight. As 1LT Fountain moved uphill in the gathering darkness he apparently lost sight of the ground and may have developed vertigo. In any case his aircraft hit the hillside some 35 feet below the crest, rolled on its right side, exploded, and burned. Both 1LT Fountain and Wessel were killed in the crash.

PFC Reinaldo L. Delgado (C/2-502 IN) was awarded the Bronze Star Medal and Purple Heart Medal (Posthumously) for military merit and for wounds received which resulted in his death from a booby trap while searching a cave in the KONTUM Province, Republic of Vietnam.

STRIKE HISTORY (Citation's and Awards):

02 January 1967



1LT Larry D. Earls (C/2-502 IN) was awarded the Silver Star Medal (Posthumously); First Lieutenant Earls had placed his platoon into a defensive perimeter. Approximately three hours later, a numerically superior determined enemy element viciously attacked the defensive perimeter with such ferocity that six of Lieutenant Earls' men were instantly killed. Realizing the possibilities of being overrun by the enemy, Lieutenant Earls, with complete disregard for his own personal safety, charged forward to the area where the action was heaviest and began to reorganize his platoon. Being constantly exposed to murderous enemy automatic weapons fire and a heavy barrage of enemy hand grenades, Lieutenant Earls moved from position to position giving his men encouragement and pointing out enemy targets. On several occasions while rallying his men, hand grenades landed near him and his men and again Lieutenant Earls braved the murderous enemy fire and personally picked up the enemy grenades and threw them back at the enemy. Having reorganized his platoon, Lieutenant Earls gave the order to assault the fanatical enemy element. His inspired men assaulted the superior enemy forces with such determination that the enemy ranks were broken and they were forced to make a hasty withdrawal. Had it not been for Lieutenant Earls' tremendous display of courage and professionalism in the face of a numerically superior enemy force many more casualties would have resulted. Lieutenant Earls' outstanding display of gallantry in action and his avid devotion to duty are within the highest military traditions and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.
